






A girl reacts as health official uses a swab to collect a sample in a village during the curfew in Sri Lanka—*Reuters*


During the last 24 hours, 796 new cases have been confirmed by different laboratories, bringing the national tally to 9216. Seven deaths from KP, five from Sindh, three from Punjab, and one from Balochistan have been reported in the last 24 hours. There are a total 192 deaths and 2066 recoveries across the country, see Chart.1.



COVID-19 is a contagious disease; it is expected to spread more rapidly in populous areas. Comparison of number of COVOID-19 cases to the population density of distinct Continents/regions reveals a different scenario. In Americas number of confirmed cases are 8,99,051 with population density of 27(Persons/Km²), while in Europe the number of cases are 10,46,854 with population density of 34(Persons/Km²). In Asia the number of infected cases are 3,78,985 with highest population density of 150(Persons/Km²), see Chart.2. Asia is way behind in number of COVID-19 cases than Europe and Americas. Africa and Oceania has least number of COVID-19 cases. Is it average high temperature providing shield to Asia, Africa and Oceania, or the high immunity in these regions? Asia and Africa are the regions with lowest per capita income and least developed medical infrastructure, many areas in Asia and Africa are hit by Malaria, Dengue and other diseases. This might help improved immunity in these regions.



Europe is the highest COVID-19 hit continent. In Europe infected cases are highest in all continents that is 44.44%, 61.59% of total COVID-19 deaths are reported in Europe, and death ratio is about 9.7%. In America 38.16% of world COVID-19 cases are reported, 28.77% died and current death ratio is 5.3%. In Asia 16% of total world COVID-19 cases reported so far, 8.91% died and 3.9% is the current death ratio. In Africa and Oceania this percentage is very low, See Chart.3. Fortunately COVID-19 cases in Pakistan are only 0.4% of total world COVID-19 cases. The COVID-19 death ratio in Pakistan is just 2% of total confirmed cases since the first COVID-19 case reported in Pakistan.



Has violence against women increased since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic?

Violence against women is highly prevalent, and intimate partner violence is the most common form of violence. During health emergencies, such as the COVID-19 pandemic, violence against women tends to increase.

Whilst data are scarce, reports from across the world, including China, the United Kingdom, the United States of America, and other countries suggest a significant increase in domestic violence cases related to the COVID-19 pandemic. Reports from other countries suggest a reduction in survivors seeking services due to a combination of lockdown measures and not wanting to attend health services for fear of infection.

Why should I care about violence against women during COVID-19?

Violence against women is a grave violation of women's human rights, no matter when, where, or how it takes place. There are many forms of violence against women, which have many potential negative health consequences for women and their children.

Violence against women can result in injuries and serious physical, mental, sexual and reproductive health problems, including sexually transmitted infections, HIV, and unplanned pregnancies. In extreme cases, violence against women can result in death.

The effects of violence are very often long-lived. Violence – in all its forms – can have an impact on a woman's well-being throughout the rest of her life. This is unacceptable, and the risks of violence that women and their children face during the current COVID-19 crisis cannot be ignored.

When we are able to prevent violence, or to support women survivors of violence, we help to safeguard women's human rights, and promote physical and mental health and well-being for women throughout their lives. This also helps to alleviate pressure on already stretched essential public services, including the health system.

COVID-19: Timeline of a Pandemic (Feb. 26, 2020 – Feb. 27, 2020)

Feb. 26—Brazil confirms its first case of COVID-19, marking the first case in South America. Cases of the virus have now been confirmed on every continent except Antarctica.

Greece, Georgia, North Macedonia, Norway, Romania and Pakistan report their first cases of COVID-19.

For the first time since the outbreak began, there are more new cases reported outside China, 459, than in China, 412.

The Asian Development Bank approves another \$2 million to help countries in Asia and the Pacific prepare for, respond to, and boost their resilience against COVID-19 and other communicable diseases.

The European Commission requests member states to review pandemic preparedness plans, and inform the commission of how they plan to implement them. The commission also announces an initiative to launch a joint procurement procedure to support its member states in accessing personal protective equipment as COVID-19 cases rise in the region, Stella Kyriakides, European commissioner for health and food safety, says during a press conference in Italy.

Feb. 27 — The number of infections globally continues to grow. There are 3,474 cases of COVID-19 — including 54 deaths — outside of China in 44 countries. Denmark, Estonia, San Marino, and the Netherlands report first cases of the virus.

"We are at a decisive point," says Tedros during a press conference. "My message to each of these countries is: This is your window of opportunity. If you act aggressively now, you can contain this virus. You can prevent people getting sick. You can save lives. So my advice to these countries is to move swiftly."

Belgium, Cambodia, India, Nepal, Philippines, Russia, Sri Lanka, and Vietnam have not reported new cases in more than two weeks, according to Tedros.

One of Iran's vice presidents, Masoumeh Ebtekar, is infected with COVID-19. She's one of several Iranian officials who has tested positive for the virus. Others include members of parliament Mojtaba Zolnour and Mahmoud Sadeghi; Morteza Rahmanzadeh, mayor of Tehran; and Iraj Harirchi, Iran's deputy health minister.

Experts' View

The civil-society-linked middle class has good people-oriented ideas but is too small at this stage to step up to fill the void. Thus, if the crisis persists and the current power structure starts to unravel, the gap may actually be filled by extremists and criminal mafias. That would be a worse outcome than the current situation. So, the best that one can hope for from this crisis is a weakening of the elitist power structure led by the establishment so as to provide increasing space for the civil-society-linked middle class to grow and provide leadership over the years. As things stand, opportunities provided by the crisis will likely go abegging again. (**Niaz Murtaza, DAWN**)


