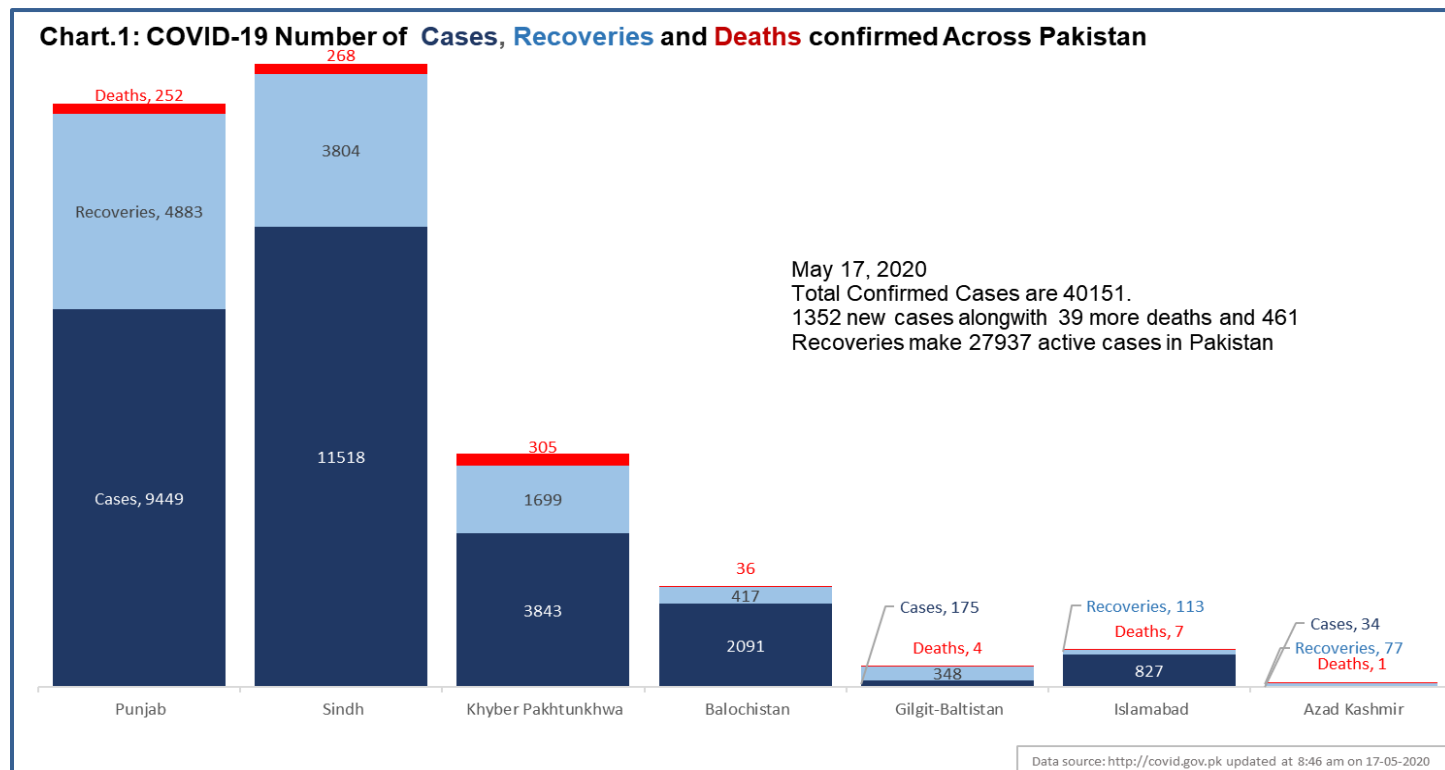

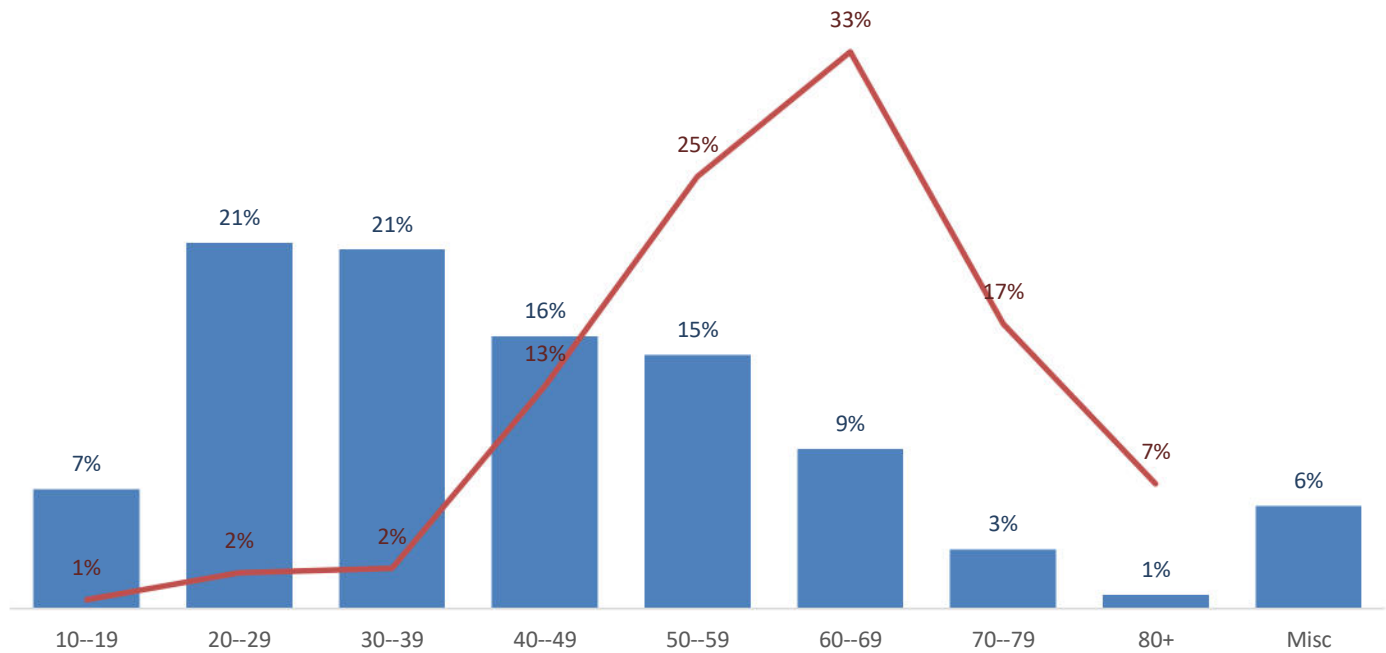

During the last 24 hours, 1352 new cases have been confirmed by different laboratories, bringing the national tally to 40151. Fourteen deaths from KP, thirteen from Sindh, seven from Punjab and five from Balochistan have been reported in the last 24 hours. There are a total 873 deaths and 11341 recoveries across the country, see Chart.1.



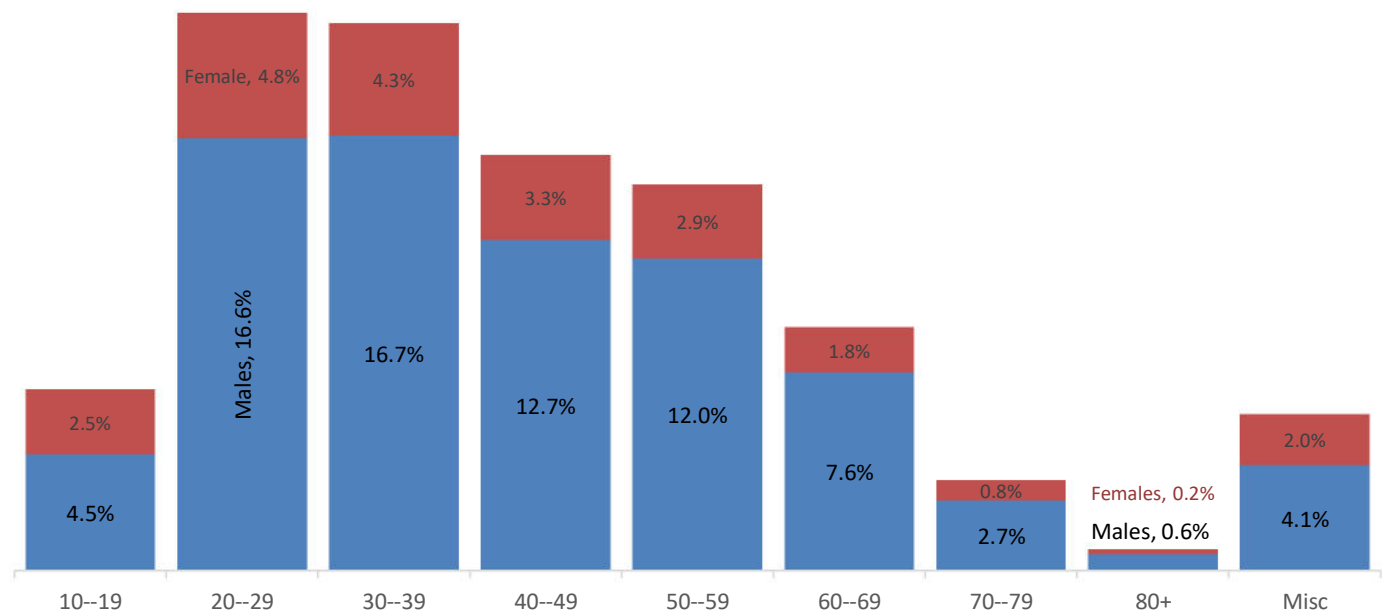
COVID-19 is contagious; in the absence of any medicine/vaccination social distancing is the only cure. More susceptible are those who are more exposed. Observing the age wise distribution of confirmed cases and reported deaths under COVID-19, identify that in Pakistan the more affected cases are the young adults. As of May 17, 2020, the spread of the Coronavirus (COVID-19) in Pakistan has hit mostly people less than 59 years of age. Almost 42% cases are reported in individuals from age 20 to 40 years, which is the prime exposed age group. Whereas lesser infected cases are observed from elder cohorts. More than 90 percent of individuals infected with the virus are less than 69 years old. Only 10 percent individuals who got infected are above 70 years old. However, the deceased cases show different trajectory as it is more to do with the immunity of individuals. The most casualties have occurred in ages between 50-69, see Chart.2.

Since the first case was detected at the end of February in Pakistan, post lock down phase, Coronavirus has been spreading fast across the country. Generally male of prime age are more vulnerable to pandemic. Particularly the male of age 20-49 are highest hit by pandemic, the female of same age group are about one fourth only, see Chart.3.

Save Lives or Economy: Paradox or dilemma for Pakistan

Recent developments on the dark stage set by Covid-19, has taken much expected turn in the backdrop of yet another looming crisis; to choose between life or daily sustenance in lowest sections of population in socio-economic hierarchy. There is, however, no denying the fact of developmental projects (effective) as a backbone for any economy, but the saner way of doing things in policy making must be first to think, observe, plan and then act. Frequently Asked Questions

Which surface disinfectants are effective against COVID-19 in non-health care setting environments?

In non-health care settings, sodium hypochlorite (bleach / chlorine) may be used at a recommended concentration of 0.1% or 1,000ppm (1 part of 5% strength household bleach to 49 parts of water). Alcohol at 70-90% can also be used for surface disinfection. Surfaces must be cleaned with water and soap or a detergent first to remove dirt, followed by disinfection. Cleaning should always start from the least soiled (cleanest) area to the most soiled (dirtiest) area in order to not spread the dirty to areas that are less soiled.

All disinfectant solutions should be stored in opaque containers, in a well-ventilated, covered area that is not exposed to direct sunlight and ideally should be freshly prepared every day.

In indoor spaces, routine application of disinfectants to surfaces via spraying is not recommended for COVID-19. If disinfectants are to be applied, these should be via a cloth or wipe which is soaked in the disinfectant.

What protection measures should people take when using disinfectants?

It is important to reduce your risk when using disinfectants:

- The disinfectant and its concentration should be carefully selected to avoid damaging surfaces and to avoid or minimize toxic effects on household members (or users of public spaces).
- Avoid combining disinfectants, such as bleach and ammonia, since mixtures can cause respiratory irritation and release potentially fatal gases.
- Keep children, pets and other people away during the application of the product until it is dry and there is no odour.
- Open windows and use fans to ventilate. Step away from odours if they become too strong. Disinfectant solutions should always be prepared in well-ventilated areas.
- Wash your hands after using any disinfectant, including surface wipes.
- Keep lids tightly closed when not in use. Spills and accidents are more likely to happen when containers are open.
- Do not allow children to use disinfectant wipes. Keep cleaning fluids and disinfectants out of the reach of children and pets.
- Throw away disposable items like gloves and masks if they are used during cleaning. Do not clean and re-use.
- Do not use disinfectant wipes to clean hands or as baby wipes.
- The minimum recommended personal protective equipment when disinfecting in non-health care settings is rubber gloves, waterproof aprons and closed shoes. Eye protection and medical masks may also be needed to protect against chemicals in use or if there is a risk of splashing.

COVID-19: Timeline of a Pandemic (March 21, 2020 — March 23, 2020)

March 21 — Ecuador's health and labor ministers resign after cases in the country surpass 500. East Timor, Angola, and Eritrea report first cases of COVID-19.

March 22 — Global cases of COVID-19 surpass 300,000. It took over three months to reach the first 100,000 confirmed cases, 12 days to reach 200,000 and three days to reach 300,000. A cargo flight lands in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, with 5.4 million face masks, 1.08 million COVID-19 diagnostic tests, 40,000 sets of protective clothing, and 60,000 sets of protective face shields for distribution throughout the African continent. The medical supplies were donated by the Jack Ma Foundation and Alibaba Foundation. Ma also announced that his foundation would donate emergency supplies to 17 countries in Asia and Latin America. WHO says there is "a rise in criminals disguising themselves as WHO to steal money or sensitive information."

Palestinian health officials report the first two cases of COVID-19 in the Gaza Strip. Uganda, Grenada, Mozambique, Dominica, and Syria report first cases of COVID-19.

March 23 — World Bank Group President David Malpass calls on bilateral creditors of the lowest-income countries to provide debt relief so these countries can focus resources on the COVID-19 pandemic. African finance ministers call for \$100 billion in funding for economic stimulus and a suspension of interest payments on public debt and sovereign bonds.

U.N. Secretary-General António Guterres calls for a global ceasefire to "help create corridors for life-saving aid, open windows for diplomacy and bring hope to places among the most vulnerable to COVID-19." Norway creates a multidonor fund with the United Nations to assist low- and middle-income countries respond to the COVID-19 crisis. "Asking people to stay at home and other physical distancing measures are an important way of slowing down the spread of the virus and buying time — but they are defensive measures. To win, we need to attack the virus with aggressive and targeted tactics — testing every suspected case, isolating and caring for every confirmed case, and tracing and quarantining every close contact," WHO Director-General Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesu says at a press conference.
